### **Behavior Corner**

#### Impulsivity in Kids

What is life like for impulsive kids? It's like their brain is constantly changing channels without their permission.

Managing impulsive behavior in children isn't about squashing their spirit or turning them into little robots. It's more like channeling a wild river into a productive stream.

How to help?...Establishing clear rules and consistent consequences is key. It's like creating a roadmap for behavior. When kids know what's expected and what will happen if they veer off course, it helps them navigate their impulses better.

Positive reinforcement is your secret weapon. Catch them being good! When you notice a child resisting an impulse or showing self-control, shower them with praise. It's like watering the flowers you want to grow in your behavioral garden.

Teaching self-regulation skills is crucial. This might involve techniques like deep breathing, counting to ten, or using "pause and think" moments. It's like giving a child a toolbox to manage their impulses.

Creating a structured environment can work wonders. Routines and predictability can help impulsive children feel more secure and in control. It's like providing a steady rhythm to dance to, rather than asking them to freestyle in chaos.

Collaboration with parents and teachers is essential. When everyone's on the same page, it creates a consistent support system for the child. It's like having a team of coaches all working towards the same goal.

And here's a final thought to keep you going: impulsivity in children isn't just a challenge; it's often paired with creativity, enthusiasm, and a zest for life. With the right guidance, these impulsive tendencies can be channeled into positive traits that will serve children well into adulthood.

**Parking:** There is metered street parking available on most streets around Southside works. IF you would rather park in a garage the Ingot parking garage is directly across the street from Pins Mechanical. You have to pay for parking though their app.

**Entrance:** You will need to have a valid ID to enter. Anyone under the age of 21 Must be accompanied by an adult at all times in the facility. Any minors must depart by 9pm.

Our location is the Hookie Hangout on the second floor. There are stairs when you first enter the space that will lead to our location. When you arrive you will receive a black wristband noting that you are with the MLEDP Night Out Event.

**Food/Drink:** We will be ordering pizza from Slice on Broadway. Both pepperoni and cheese pizza will be available. All staff and family are welcome to enjoy the food and refillable soft drinks on MLEDP's tab. All staff members will receive a drink ticket for one alcoholic drink provided by MLEDP. Staff will be responsible for the cost of any additional alcoholic drinks. PINS will use the black wristband to note who is with our group for payment purposes.

**Games:** We are located in the Hookie Hangout which gives us reserved use of this games. There are other free games such as bocce, giant jenga, gaming systems, pong etc that are available if not reserved by another group. There are also pinball machines and video game throughout the building.

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
