Behavior Corner

Make It Right Consequences: Learning to Repair and Restore- A New Start

Sometimes nothing seems to work. Consequences only inflame a bad situation, incentives lead nowhere, and reasoning is completely futile. It can be frustrating when methods that typically work for others are not for the stubborn child. Time to focus on creating a sphere of safety and kindness. This is likely happening at your center already, but this child may not recognize it and very much needs to know (s)he is secure and loved. Connection is important... to help the child calm down, to be understanding, to find solutions. Continue the logical consequences discussed last month to teach empathy, not just a quick fix.

Example: You may see the child say, "I'm sorry" for the wrong, but see no genuine remorse and reconciliation. The child may think that they can say or do whatever they need to get out of trouble. Quick, forced "reconciliation" may even foster a pattern of, "I can hurt someone; just do a little something nice, and it's all good." Instead take a moment ask guiding questions to help the hurt child articulate the impact of the grievance and their feelings. This can be empowering and even healing for both. As you suspend any judgments and help the aggressive child really listen to the one they hurt and make right what they did wrong, this can grow compassion and confidence that will decrease the likelihood of continued aggression.

When you take time building personal connections you can provide the security and love children need to have fun and navigate difficulties while respecting others.
